

Current trends in non surgical facial rejuvenation:

Botulinum Toxin/Injectable Fillers

Over the past few years, non-surgical facial rejuvenation techniques together with other so-called anti-ageing medical treatments have seen a considerable development.

An older albeit active population, social as well professional constraints, media pressure, the stigma of the ageing look have all contributed to the demand and provision of "lunch break" type of minimally invasive treatments. This has led to a multiplication of commercial products proposed to practitioners of different backgrounds in a practically non regulated healthcare frame.

The vast majority of proposed courses being industry driven (openly or not), their goal is to promote specific products rather than enlighten the practitioner, to enable him/her to choose within the myriad of available products the one which is most suitable for the patient.

Course Aim

To present the science behind the art, the methodology, the indications, the tricks as well as the pitfalls of the use of botulinum toxin and the injectable fillers (predominantly hyaluronic acid).

- 1 To understand facial topographic parameters in aesthetic analysis.
- 2 To be aware of the mechanisms of ageing in the face.
- 3 To understand the remit of botulinum toxin in facial rejuvenation.
- 4 To learn to differentiate the different injectables depending on indication and site.
